

A stroke can be life changing

Most people, about 80%, now survive a stroke due to increased awareness of the signs of stroke and improvements in stroke management. This results in more Canadians living with the effects of stroke and requiring services and supports as they recover, especially those who return home or to a community setting.

The stroke navigator helps to identify the needs of each individual and goals will be met through a variety of supports such as coordination of care, education and system navigation to access community support services.

A stroke is a brain injury and is caused by either, a blockage of the blood flow to the brain or a rupture of blood vessels in the brain. Every stroke is different and the effects vary from person to person based on the type of stroke, the severity and part of the brain affected and the number of strokes. Symptoms that may occur after stroke include limitations of physical movements, loss of speech, memory problems, changes in behaviour and personality and loss of vision.

Our health care system has become much better at dealing with the medical fallout when a stroke happens but many stroke survivors and caregivers are unprepared for what follows after hospital discharge. Our Stroke Navigator Program offers non-medical, community support to assist stroke survivors and their caregivers to find their way in the complex care system, with the adjustment
